The 2019 Legislative Session in Summary

The 66th legislative session appeared to be an uphill battle for the Labor Movement thanks to a 58-42 Republican Majority in the house and a 30-20 Republican Majority in the Senate. Even though the Senate Majority was slightly reduced from the previous session, one of the more conservative members was reelected to serve as president. However, initial fears of a drastic anti-worker turn were quelled thanks to the efforts of the self-proclaimed "Solutions-Caucus." This group of moderate Republicans joined with Democrats to kill bills harmful to workers while passing common-sense legislation improving the lives of Montanans. Ironically, at times, the primary threats we faced this session came from individuals we normally consider allies.

Pre-kindergarten education dominated the 2019 session. Recognizing its importance, The Montana AFL-CIO and our affiliate the Montana Federation of Public Employees (MFPE) worked with Governor Bullock to propose HB 225, his primary school funding bill that also included funding for public pre-k. MFPE member legislator and minority party leader Casey Schreiner carried the legislation. HB 225 correctly placed pre-k in public schools but the House Education Committee ignored the bill for two months before finally tabling it.

When it became apparent that HB 225 would die in committee, Governor Bullock began back channel negotiations with Republican Party leadership to pass a modified pre-k bill. The new bill, HB 755, would have allowed public dollars to fund private pre-k providers that could deny services to low-income and special needs students. It also created a new state department dedicated to pre-k education directed by a cabinet position appointed by the Governor instead of being housed within the Office of Public Instruction. This pre-k Director would have had near unilateral ability to alter the program as they see fit, politicizing pre-k in future Gubernatorial elections.

The majority of Democrats in the House Education Committee supported the Governor's harmful legislation. The Labor Movement tabled the bill in committee by working with Republicans and two lone Democrats, MFPE members Moffie Funk and Connie Keogh. Unfortunately, that was not the end for HB 755. Governor Bullock and Democrats twice attempted to amend HB 755 into a budget companion bill under the cover of darkness in the last week of the legislative session. The Labor Movement again defeated these back-door attempts, but it was disheartening to see friends and allies utilize legislative tricks in their attempts to pass a bill strongly opposed by the entire public education and organized labor communities.

For 20 years, firefighters were unable to pass presumptive healthcare through the floor of both chambers. Heading into the 66th Montana Legislature, Montana remained one of four states that did not have a presumption for firefighters covered by workers' compensation who contract diseases due to their jobs. The Montana State Council of Professional Fire Fighters worked with Democratic legislator, Sen. Nate McConnell, to extend health coverage to firefighters who suffer from workplace illnesses through workers' compensation. SB 160 will end denials of care for firefighters who suffer chronic health problems linked to smoke inhalation and other workplace hazards. This session, several factors aligned that enabled SB 160 to pass comfortably. Bipartisanship leadership in both chambers came together to pass a fair and balanced piece of legislation ensuring firefighters get the care they deserve.

For the first time since the 2005 session the Legislature passed the state and university employee pay plan (HB 175) exactly as labor representatives and the governor had bargained. HB 175 provides modest base pay increases and holds the line on health care costs and benefits. It also provides state workers who travel on the job their first per diem increase in 26 years! Democrat Rep. Moffie Funk carried the original pay plan legislation (HB 13), but Republican leadership set Funk's bill aside and assigned the legislation to Republican Rep. Julie Dooling. MFPE. Dooling, Republican Sen. and co-sponsor Terry Gauthier, and MFPE worked collaboratively to successfully pass HB 175.

With lawsuits from environmental groups forcing Colstrip's two older units to close by 2022, the power plant remained a central issue in Helena. Working with Sen. Jason Small, the Montana AFL-CIO crafted legislation enabling the local union labor force to compete for the eventual remediation jobs. SB 264 provides

prevailing wages for this work and levels the playing field for union workers competing for remediation jobs. The legislation also creates the opportunity for apprentice utilization, ensuring enough labor to meet the demand.

The legislature also took steps to preserve pensions for coal miners. SB 201 passed, protecting pension and remediation obligations at the Rosebud Coal Mine.

Unfortunately, success was not universal for members at Colstrip. Northwestern Energy, a Montana utility and partial owner of Colstrip Unit 4, brought forward legislation easing their ability to purchase 150 megawatts of energy. SB 331would have kept our union sisters and brothers employed in Unit 4 and the accompanying Rosebud Coal Mine. Unfortunately, it became a casualty in the legislative fight between environmental groups and Northwestern Energy. SB 331 died on the House floor leaving the workers and community of Colstrip without a long-term solution.

This session finally passed legislation to support the building and construction trades by investing in Montana's infrastructure. An \$80 million funding package was passed to pay for infrastructure projects that will include a mix of cash and borrowed money. The state lodging tax was raised from 3 percent to 4 percent to generate revenue for The Historical Society's new Heritage Center, over the next five years. The Labor Movement also defeated an attempt to privatize our members work and attacks on prevailing wage, workers' comp, and many other issues. These issues are covered in our scorecard.

Overall, despite the challenges, the Labor Movement saw a very successful session. The State Federation extends its heartfelt thanks to the Labor Lobby. More than 25 Labor Lobbyists and union leaders from around the state met on a weekly basis to share priorities, exchange intel, and formulate strategy to protect working Montanans. Without this solidarity, meeting the challenges the legislature presented would have been impossible



How A Bill Becomes Law



Definitions

Session or Standing Committees are legislative panels that meet every session to consider and hold public hearings on bills in a specific policy area such as Business & Labor, Health, Tax, Education, etc.

Bill Died in Committee means the bill failed to gain enough votes to pass out of the Committee to be heard in the 2^{nd} Reading. Bills that died in committee never come up for a full vote and therefore aren't included in the MT AFL-CIO Scorecard.

 2^{nd} Reading is the first time a bill goes to a vote of the full chamber. 2^{nd} Reading votes can be used in the Montana AFL-CIO Voting Scorecard if the bill had no changes or amendments at the point of both the 2^{nd} Reading and the 3^{rd} Reading.

Floor Action refers to the vote after 2nd or 3rd Reading. The vote that is the "Floor Action" happens on the floor of either the House or Senate as opposed to Committee Action.

3rd Reading is the last time a bill goes to a vote of the full chamber.

Transmittal is the mid-period break in the 90-day Legislative Session where bills are transmitted from the House to the Senate and vice versa. If a bill isn't at the appropriate stage to be transmitted to the other chamber on the deadline for transmittal, it automatically dies.



Legislative Program

WORKING MEN AND WOMEN

Key Legislation

HB 175 – State Employee Pay Plan, Julie Dooling (R-Townsend)

Position – Support

Description – This is the pre-budget negotiated pay plan for Montana's state employees, which provides modest pay increases and holds the line on health care costs and benefits. It also provides state workers who travel on the job their first per diem increase in 25 years.

Status – Signed by Governor

HB 214 – Weakening Work Comp, Vince Ricci (R-Laurel)

Position – Oppose

Description – Would have opened workers' compensation for public employees to the private market, which would weaken a worker's access to benefits and negotiating power regarding their care.

Status – Tabled in Senate Business and Labor Committee

HB 476 – Provide low-interest loan for coal-fired generation, Jim Keane (D-Butte)

Position – Support

Description – Allows the Montana Board of Investment to make low-interest loans for coal-fired generation and associated transmission. Coal entities will have to demonstrate how the loan will be paid back.

Status - Signed by Governor

HB 710 – Prescription Drug Cost Transparency, Katie Sullivan (D-Missoula)

Position – Support

Description - Would require pharmaceutical manufacturers to provide information on why the price of a drug has increased.

Status – Tabled in Senate Public Health, Welfare, and Safety

SB 93 – Require Bonding for Solar Facilities, Tom Richmond (R-Billings)

Position – Support

Description – Requires bonding through the state before the construction of a solar facility that is greater than or equal to 2 megawatts.

Status – Signed by Governor

SB 160 – Firefighter Health and Safety Act, Nate McConnell (D-Missoula)

Position – Support

Description - Extends health coverage to firefighters who suffer from workplace illnesses. SB 160 will end denials of care for firefighters who suffer chronic health problems linked to smoke inhalation and other workplace hazards.

Status - Signed by Governor

SB 201 – Pension Protection, Duane Ankney (R-Colstrip)

Position – Support

Description – Provides pension protection for workers at the Rosebud Coal Mine and assurance that remediation requirements are met.

Status – Signed by Governor

SB 234 – Privatization of Workers' Comp, Steve Fitzpatrick (R-Great Falls)

Position - Oppose

Description – Would establish a step towards the privatization of workers compensation in Montana, while weakening workers' access to benefits and negotiating power regarding their care.

Status - Died on the House Floor

SB 264 – Prevailing Wage for Colstrip Remediation Work, Jason Small (R-Busby)

Position – Support

Description - Provides prevailing wages for remediation work at Colstrip and gives the local union labor force a level playing field when competing for remediation jobs.

Status – Signed by Governor

SB 307 – Public Private Partnership for Infrastructure, Jeffrey Welborn (R-Dillon)

Position - Oppose

Description - Would establish a public-private partnership funding mechanism for public infrastructure projects, which would have altered traditional operation and maintenance of public projects and lead to the privatization of otherwise union jobs.

Status: Died on the House Floor

SB 338 – Montana Heritage Center, Terry Gauthier (R-Helena)

Position – Support

Description - Raises the state lodging tax from 3 percent to 4 percent to raise money for The Historical Society's new Heritage Center, over the next five years. Twenty percent of the additional money also is dedicated to a new grant program for local historical sites and museums.

Status – Signed by Governor
